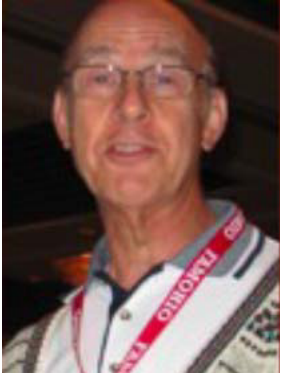

A Personal and Professional Journey to Conquer Hemophilia through Science

By Glenn Pierce, MD, PhD

Dr. Pierce will give a firsthand account of the challenges and triumphs the bleeding disorder community has faced in treatment and quality of life issues. He will also share how his personal story was a catalyst for him to become a lead researcher in the community.

Dr. Pierce currently serves on the World Federation of Hemophilia (WFH) and WFHUSA Board of Directors and the National Hemophilia Foundation (US) Medical and Scientific Advisory Council (MASAC), and is a Visiting Scholar at University of California, San Diego. Glenn retired from Biogen in 2014, where he most recently led the Hematology, Cell and Gene Therapies division. He had overall responsibility for Research & Development for hemophilia and hemoglobinopathies and led the research and clinical development of prolonged half-life FVIII and FIX as Chief Medical Officer since joining the company in 2009. At Biogen, Glenn spearheaded the initiation of the Humanitarian Aid collaboration with WFH, and My Life Our Future, a genotyping and genomic biobank initiative with NHF.

Previously, Dr. Pierce worked at Bayer Healthcare, where he was Scientific Head, U.S. Research Center and Vice President, Hematology, and led the research on Bayer's prolonged half-life FVIII. He is the co-author of more than 150 scientific papers, has more than a 15 patents, and is a member of numerous medical and scientific groups including the WFH, NHF, ISTH and ASH. Glenn was born with severe hemophilia A. He was untreated throughout childhood, has many of the complications of hemophilia, and was cured in 2008.

Dr. Gruppo has published over 70 peer-reviewed manuscripts, invited reviews and textbook chapters. He served on the board of directors for numerous hemophilia advisory committees. Dr. Gruppo's research interests are hemophilia, particularly prophylaxis and immune tolerance of inhibitors, and on the etiology, diagnosis and treatment of thrombotic diseases in children.

Community Counts: Public Health Surveillance for Bleeding Disorders

Community Counts is a project funded since September 2011 by Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) through a cooperative agreement awarded to American Thrombosis and Hemostasis Network. The purpose of this initiative is to work with the hemophilia treatment centers (HTCs) throughout the country to learn more about hemophilia and bleeding disorders. Through this project we are better able to describe the populations receiving care at the HTCs and learn more about the health of these persons including inhibitors. Come and learn how you and your family fit into the vast US bleeding disorder family.

Becky Dudley is the director of the National Surveillance for American Thrombosis and Hemostasis Network (ATHN). She is a licensed clinical social worker and has over 25 years of experience in hemophilia. Before joining ATHN, Becky served for 12 years as the regional coordinator for Region VII working with the HTCs and chapters in Iowa, Missouri, Nebraska, and Kansas. Prior to becoming the regional coordinator, Becky was the HTC social worker for 10 years at the Kansas City Hemophilia Treatment Center in Kansas City, Missouri.

Brandi (Cooke) Dupervil serves as a health scientist at the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) in the Division of Blood Disorders (DBD) where she has worked since 2011. Prior to joining DBD Brandi worked for the Office of the Director as a student statistical intern for two years. In her current role Brandi spends most of her time working on the Community Counts component of the Public Health Surveillance for the Prevention of Complications of Bleeding and Clotting Disorders.

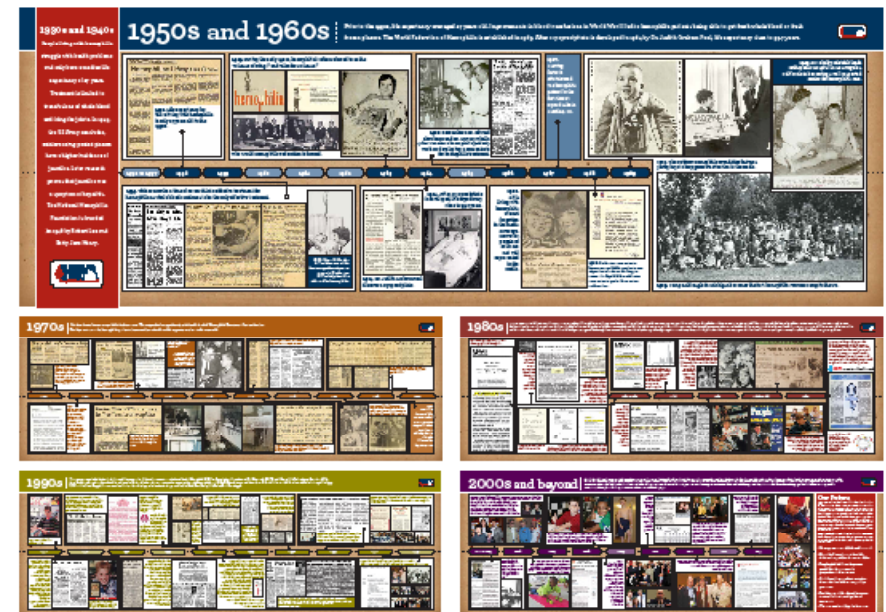
HEMOPHILIA PANEL DISPLAY
