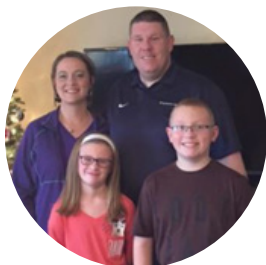

The Foundation for Women and Girls with Blood Disorders & My Story

Ann Marie and Stephanie have teamed up to present an informative and personal presentation combining the initiatives of the Foundation for Women and Girls with Blood Disorders and a personal story detailing the challenges of diagnosis and treatment of a bleeding disorder. The session promises to be a complementary presentation of the patient's challenges and strategies to navigate them along with the Foundation's strategies to educate physicians and healthcare providers and improve diagnosis, care and management. Both sets of strategies are aimed at optimizing health outcomes for women and girls with bleeding disorders.

COURSE INFO & SPEAKER BIOS

Ann-Marie Nazzaro, PhD, is the executive director of the Foundation for Women & Girls with Blood Disorders (FWGBD), which focuses on educating providers and changing lives. Ann-Marie completed graduate training at the University of Michigan (MA degree); and doctoral training in health communications research and public health education at the University of Pennsylvania (PhD).

In 2009, Ann-Marie began developing FWGBD with the cadre of world-renowned physicians who founded the organization. FWGBD was launched in 2010 to serve as a single source, single site of information and education of excellence for healthcare providers in the area of blood disorders and their unique challenges for women and girls.

Ann-Marie Nazzaro has more than 25 years of leadership experience in the non-profit or NGO sector. She served for 12 years as the Vice President for Education at the National Hemophilia Foundation USA where she inaugurated and helped develop awareness and prevention campaigns. She has also authored numerous peer-reviewed articles and co-authored a book chapter concerning advocacy for women with bleeding disorders.

Stephanie Sibrel, RN, BSN, is the nurse coordinator for the Northwest Ohio Hemophilia Center located at the Toledo Children's Hospital in Toledo, Ohio. She received an associate's degree from Owen's Community College and a bachelor of science in nursing from Spring Arbor University.

Stephanie is a member of the National Hemophilia Foundation and an active volunteer with the Northwest Ohio Hemophilia Foundation. Stephanie is married, has two sons and three stepchildren. Stephanie and her two sons have bleeding disorders. Consequently, she has experienced firsthand many of the struggles and challenges facing the bleeding disorder community and brings much passion to her role as a nurse coordinator and advocate.

In 2012, she was honored as Nurse of the Year by the National Hemophilia Foundation. Kristen currently provides medical education in the Mid-Atlantic Territory of the United States.

2. Identify pros-and cons of current factor products
3. Describe ½ life extension options for factor products
4. Explore new options for treatment other than factor replacement

Amy Dunn, MD, is an associate clinical professor of pediatrics at Nationwide Children's Hospital/Ohio State University where she is the director of pediatric hematology at the hemophilia treatment center. Dr. Dunn received her medical degree from Wright State University School of Medicine in Dayton, Ohio and completed her pediatric and pediatric hematology/oncology training at Emory University in Atlanta, Georgia.

Dr. Dunn is a member of various professional associations including the American Society of Hematology, World Federation of Hemophilia, International Society of Thrombosis and Hemostasis, International Pediatric Hemophilia Network, International Prophylaxis Study Group, and the Hemophilia Research Society.

Dr. Dunn has served as a reviewer for hematologic journals and has published numerous peer-reviewed articles, abstracts, and textbook chapters. In addition, she has given many presentations at national and international medical symposia. She has received awards that include US News and World Report Top Doctors and the Atlanta Business Chronicle Healthcare Hero for Healthcare Innovation.

What You Need to Know about Hemophilia

Universal Health Care: How Does This Affect You?

In this session you will hear an overview of how to navigate your available insurance options and how to cover out of pocket costs through the patient assistance and state programs. There will be an outline of current advocacy issues that may impact your healthcare. There will be time for questions and answers to pressing access issues.

Randi Clites the advocacy coordinator for the Ohio Bleeding Disorder Council (OBDC) and Program/Advocacy Manager at the Northern Ohio Hemophilia Foundation (NOHF). Randi has a business administration degree from Hiram College with a minor in political science.

Before she became chapter staff she was an active volunteer with the OBDC, Hemophilia Federation of America (HFA), and National Hemophilia Foundation First Step and was an NOHF and FAMOHIO board member. Randi lives in Ravenna, located in Northeast Ohio, with her husband of 21 years, Matt, and 14 year-old son, Colton. Colton is a leukemia and brain bleed survivor and has severe hemophilia A.

INFANT'S PROGRAM

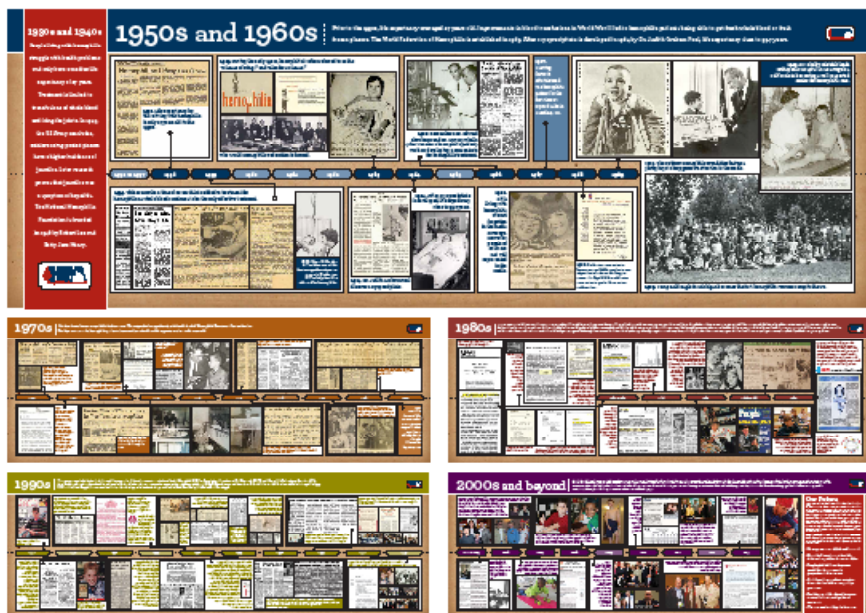
