## **Unpacking Hemophilia: Perspectives from Living in a Developing Country**

By Jose Mari Jonathan Antonio “Jojo” *Dublin I*



Poverty is present everywhere but when hemophilia comes into play, the combination in developing countries is of great magnitude for both affected individuals and their families. Inadequate medical care, lack of insurance of pre-existing disorders, prohibitive cost of medication, misunderstanding of the disorder and its implications on everyday life all make everyday living doubly challenging. There remains a constant struggle not only in meeting the basic needs of food, clothing and shelter but also against distress, disability, and premature death.

The talk presents a profound conversation about this double burden in the Philippine context and current ways that the government and international non-profit organizations have tried to assist persons afflicted and their families in raising their quality of life.

Jojo is the development advisor at Save One Life. Prior to joining Save One Life as Development Advisor, Jojo Antonio was the Development Officer of the United Way Youth Venture of North Central Massachusetts. He also worked as Institutional Advancement Officer of Stillman University, the oldest American school in the Philippines and in Asia, where he led and managed various fund or resource generation campaign, corporate and foundation relations, donor management, and special development projects. Previously, he was the Division Head of

### **New Products and the Future of Hemophilia Treatment**

Dr.Riten Kumar, MD, MSc, is the Associate Director for the Pediatric Hemostasis and Thrombosis Fellowship, a Physician in the Hematology/



Oncology and BMT Clinic at Nationwide Children's Hospital and an Associate Professor of Pediatrics at The Ohio State University College of Medicine.

Kumar realized his passion to further study benign hematology; he then completed a pediatric hematology-oncology fellowship at the Mayo Clinic in Minnesota while receiving a Masters in Clinical and Translational Science from the Mayo School of Graduate Medical Education. In addition, Dr. Kumar completed a second fellowship in Pediatric Thrombosis and Hemostasis at the Hospital for Sick Children, University of Toronto, Canada. He joined Nationwide Children's in July 2013. In collaboration with Bryce A. Kerlin, MD, Dr. Kumar created the Joan Fellowship in Pediatric Thrombosis and Hemostasis to train future physicians in hematology.

Dr. Kumar was recently named recipient of the Young Researcher Award (2014-2015) by the World Federation of Hemophilia and the Eberhard Mammen Young Investigator Award (2014-2015) by Seminars of Thrombosis and Hemostasis. He is also a recipient of the Hemostasis and Thrombosis Research Society, Mentored Research Award (2016-2018).

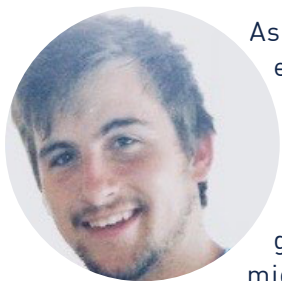
